Thirty-eight (38) Mad Science assemblies were conducted at K8 and middle schools for students in Grades 6-8, with 6,070 students participating. Two hundred ninety-three (293) high school students at Alba, Garfield, Twain, Point Loma, San Diego MVPA, University City, and students from Madison's DHH program received tobacco prevention instruction from Playwrights Project staff members.

Tobacco Use Prevention Booster Lessons were taught to students in Grades 10 and 11. Students in Grade 9 received the Bullying/Harassment/Intimidation lesson and students in Grade 12 received the Alcohol Use Prevention lesson, in compliance with district mandates. Anti-tobacco instruction along with Tobacco Facts Sheets which emphasize tobacco cessation, were incorporated into all Booster Lesson Presentations for students in Grades 9-12.

Comments regarding question 6:

The Guiding Good Choices Parenting Workshop was conducted at Johnson Elementary School, Audubon K8, Bethune K8, Logan K8, Challenger Middle School, Standley Middle School, Wilson Middle School, Crawford High School, and Lincoln High School. One hundred eight (108) parents participated in the workshops, along with 51 students.

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Comments regarding question 9:

The 52,590 projected students noted above includes all students in Grades 6-12 who were invited to participate in the 2013-14 Teens Kick Ash Great American Smokeout Activities, as identified by the Grant. Age and developmentally appropriate information and activities were placed on the Counseling and Guidance website for students during Red Ribbon Week. The information posted was largely focused on tobacco use prevention and cessation for students, staff, and parents. All information was posted throughout the 2013-14 school year.

Comments regarding question 14:

The Teens Kick Ash and Prevention is Cool Anti-Tobacco Journalism Events were held concurrently on 10/15/13, with 46 students and 15 adults in attendance. The information from the events was shared by student leaders with 5,481 students at represented school sites during the Great American Smokeout activities and throughout the school year.

Comments regarding question 17:

Due to privacy/confidentiality issues, data from the LGBTQ population could not be obtained. Our reported numbers for the White (non-Hispanic) sub-group are as follows: Twenty-one (21) students participated in the Focus Groups (Youth Involvement in Anti-Tobacco Advocacy) and 20 participated in the Teens Kick Ash/Prevention is Cool Anti-Tobacco Journalism Event (Media Literacy and Youth Media Production to Counter the Influence of the Tobacco Industry, and Tobacco use prevention Peer Educator).

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Comments regarding question 19:

Students who did not complete TEG dis-enrolled from the district, sought assistance for tobacco use cessation outside of the district, were experiencing difficulty with school attendance, or were identified very late in the school year. Tobacco Facts Sheets and pamphlets from the California Smoker's Helpline emphasizing tobacco cessation were distributed to students during TEG meetings.

Comments regarding question 22:

Due to privacy/confidentiality issues, data from the LGBTQ population could not be obtained. Our reported numbers for the White (non-Hispanic) sub-group are as follows: Sixty-nine (69) students participated in TEG and 1,435 students participated in Project Life; of the 6,148 students who participated in Project Life, 270 were identified as Multi-racial. Two (2) White (non-Hispanic) students participated in Tobacco-Free Generations.

Comments regarding question 24:

Three hundred seventy-six (376) students were identified and/or referred to TAP via TEG (Tobacco Education Group), which is facilitated prior to TAP being offered. Of the 376 students who were identified and/or referred, 294 students participated in TEG and were given the opportunity to continue with TAP immediately after TEG had ended, and again at the six-week follow-up meetings. All declined to participate. Information about the California Smoker's Helpline and nicotine usage, along with Tobacco Facts Sheets, were distributed to all students during TEG meetings.

Due to privacy/confidentiality issues, data from the LGBTQ population could not be obtained. Our reported numbers for the White (non-Hispanic) sub-group are as follows: Sixty-nine (69) students received information about the California Smoker's Helpline via participation in TEG (Tobacco Education Group).
